Comments from Dr. Alexander Riegel

Greetings Everyone,

It is GREAT to be starting my second year with you, this time as your settled minister. I am looking forward to another year of positive, forward moving energy, this time ignited and sustained by our mutual commitment to be doing ministry together in the Pointes and surrounding areas for the foreseeable future. Toward that end I am putting my energies this Fall into three specific things: adult education, social justice, and building connections with like-minded groups and people in our area. Regarding the first two, I am currently working on increasing the size of these committees and altering the models by which they operate. A number of people have shown interest in participating in these committees and if you would like to do so as well, but haven't indicated such, please send me an email and let me know that:

I am also looking forward to creating the sermon calendar for the coming year, which I've already begun. If you have sermon requests, ideas, or other such suggestions please let me know. I'm happy to incorporate people's request into my thinking as I create sermon topics for the coming year. Things already on the docket include: community as a spiritual path; social justice topics (race relations, women's rights, and GLBT issues); the power of vulnerability; the wisdom of the pre-Socratics; the Gospel of Thomas; the divine feminine; and a monthly series entitled "Whatever Happened to Sin?" (looking at the seven vices and their corresponding virtues for the modern life). I'm also considering an animal blessing, something many UU churches do, which would take place in early October.

A few people have asked when adult education programming will kick off this year. Typically I begin that in September but I think this year we will wait until October, after the Installation. Along these lines, I hope people have the Installation on their calendar, as it is an important event in the life of the church: Sunday, September 27 at 4 PM.

Similarly, you may already have seen notification that I will be doing a repeat performance of The Holy Longing at The War Memorial, Saturday evening, November 14. Hopefully you'll be able to join us, if a second serving suits your fancy. Even further, I strongly encourage you to invite anybody you think might have an affinity for the mystic poets, as we would like to see a very good turnout in light of the fact that that The War Memorial has agreed to let us use their wonderful ballroom for the event.

The Demand for Tutors Exceeds Supply

This year, ten of our members and friends tutored in three Detroit Public Schools: Detroit Merit, Nicholson and Clark. Yet we did not have enough tutors to fill the requests of a first and second grade teacher at Merit and a second grade teacher at Maire school in Grosse Pointe. There are many ways to tutor that meet your needs and the teacher's. Tutors and the teachers work out the best day, best time, and subject matter, usually reading and/or math. However, some members work in the library, and one worked with the Broadcast Club that met after school to improve the PA announcements. If you have a hobby or talent to share, the school clubs meet for an hour on Wednesdays for a period of eight weeks scheduled several times during the year. Most tutors volunteer an hour and a half a week, although some prefer longer sessions or several sessions a week.

The schools are happy to have us as tutors and are very appreciative and vocal about it. The students also show their appreciation in different ways according to their age, but all of them grow quite attached to our presence and worry about us if we have to miss a week. The schools are flexible and accommodating too. Even snowbirds who are gone for the winter months are welcome.
