UNFAMILIAR WITH ZOOM? - DO THIS IN ADVANCE OF SUNDAY

- If you are unfamiliar with Zoom, become acquainted with the technology it is
 easy to use but going through these steps in advance will ensure you are ready.
- Click on the Zoom link that will be emailed on the Friday prior to the Sunday service at least 15 minutes before you plan to use it the first time. This will prompt an app to download onto your device. You may use a laptop, tablet, desktop or smartphone.
- You will then be asked whether you wish to join the "meeting" with your device audio and device camera.
 - If you do not want others to see what you are wearing at that moment, you can join without activating your camera.
 - Throughout the service, all participants besides the worship leaders will be muted to prevent background noises (barking dogs, ringing phones, etc.) from being included in the worship service.

Alexander's Meander



September 2020

In *The Metamorphosis*, Franz Kafka created the character Gregor Samsa, who awoke one morning to discover that he had transformed into an insect (the description of which very much resembles a cockroach). Kafka often wrote of such cognitive dissonance in his characters, brought about by their sense of alienation from a world that had ceased to function as one would expect.

We are now in the sixth month of this pandemic, which has radically reshaped the way our world functions. We are more isolated than we have ever been. When we *are* out and about, there are new rules and regulations regarding social behavior. We have become hyper-conscious about any indicators that our health might be at risk. And, we are deeply concerned about the well-being of children and the elderly, not to mentioned uncertain as how best to care for them (Is it safe to send our children to school? Should we move mom out of her retirement home and into our house?).

Given this new reality, by now most everyone has experienced the cognitive dissonance of which Kafka wrote - we've all felt a little bit like Gregor Samsa.

Under such conditions, it is important for us to remember to look for normalcy in our lives, for it *does* still exist. We still have those interpersonal relationships that have always given definition and meaning to our lives: partners, children, parents, best friends, coworkers... Nature still abounds in all its beauty, inviting us to participate in its sacred depth (as I stare at the hummingbird darting about its feeder outside my window). And, there is still much meaning to be made, in the work we do and how we show up for other people.

As we enter the fall and winter months, we are told that there is hope for a vaccine come January, *if* all goes according to best laid plans. But we are also told to brace ourselves for the worst social health conditions we've faced in 100 years, due to the spread of Covid complicated by a potentially intense flu season. A phrase Mark Franchett used during our Committee on Ministry meeting last night was, "Plan for the worst and hope for the best!" Sound advice in these times!

Here's some more sound advice... Lean into your church community. *We're still here!* I imagine that for some of you church has seemed out of sight and out of mind during this pandemic. But our lay leadership, which includes many generous volunteers, has worked diligently to keep the organization intact and the ministry functioning. In addition, our staff has continued to step up as well. I have been involved in meetings throughout the summer (Virtual Programs, Committee on Ministry, the Board, Social Justice, and Adult Ed), including my involvement in our local NAACP chapter and The Family Center, on which Executive Board I now sit and Program committee I now chair. Julie Artis has been diligently planning how effectively to continue religious education for our children this fall. (Though everybody is "zoomed out" at this point, I hope parents will keep their children engaged in the program Julie will be presenting!) Our new Office Administrator, Ameera, has impressively handled her learning curve and we are in good hands moving forward with this new member of our staff! And of course, though our Music Director Joseph Palazzolo has taken the summer off, he stepped up impressively in the spring and I'm sure will pick up where he left off come September.

In sum, the social distancing this pandemic warrants and the requisite digital ministry it requires has been challenging for everyone. As your minister, the awkwardness of all of this is particularly poignant for me. More than anything I want everyone to continue to feel connected to our beloved community and me as your minister. So, *lean in <u>and don't be shy about reaching out to me or any other member of our staff or lay leadership!* In the meantime, I very much look forward to "getting back in the pulpit" following Labor Day!</u>

Special Report

Special Report to the GPUC congregation and friends

Our GPUC board of trustees has formed a committee to recommend and implement policies and procedures regarding use of church facilities during this COVID pandemic. Currently meetings in the church buildings are not allowed. Also, restrictions have been put in place requiring the use of masks, social distancing and calling ahead to schedule visits to the church for in person business.

The reopening committee had its first meeting on July 29. Members of the committee are Russell Chavey, Jenevieve Lilly, Sonja Franchett, Rev. Alex, Jennifer Keyser, Lynn Baker-Hunter, Christy Winder, Meghan Boomhower, Veronica Smith and Julie Artis.

As a starting point, the committee agreed that GPUC will follow all the restrictions and guidelines put in place by our Governor. In accordance with our belief in each individual's worth and dignity the UUA recommends that all churches only have virtual services through at least May of 2021. The church has received a few requests from groups to use church facilities for their activities. There have been requests for use of indoor spaces as well as outdoor spaces. The committee considered the procedures that would need to be implemented prior to allowing indoor use and determined that it would be very difficult for the church to implement and enforce the needed masking and distancing restrictions as well as cleaning and disinfecting such activities would require. The cost to the church would far exceed any reasonable rental fee we could consider charging. Additionally, if the annex were to be used for such activities it would likely preclude use of the annex by the resale shop. Use of outdoor spaces is much easier to implement but always raises the issue of bathroom availability and again enforcement of social distancing.

In conclusion, the committee has recommended that *at this time* no meetings be allowed in any church facility. Meetings or other church related activities may occur using outdoor spaces but all such activities will need to be scheduled through the church administrator (so as to avoid multiple users arriving simultaneously). Anyone hosting such outdoor gatherings will be asked to enforce social distancing guidelines and advise participants that bathroom facilities should not be expected to be available. Non church groups may be allowed to use outdoor spaces if they agree to abide by social distancing guidelines and limits on group size. Approval for such use may be given by church staff including Rev. Alex, Ameera and Julie. The church will prepare and implement a Covid Preparedness and Response Plan following the guidelines of MIOSHA.

This committee will monitor the changing recommendations of State government, the CDC, MIOSHA, the UUA and other pertinent experts and regulatory agencies. Recommendations will change in accordance with the advice of these groups. Of course, we all long for the day when we will once again gather in beloved community as before this pandemic while at the same time protecting the health of our church members and staff.

It is anticipated that even after in church activities resume, virtual streaming of services, meetings and other church activities will continue for those who cannot attend in person or for personal reasons would prefer to attend virtually. Others in our church community are researching what additional equipment we may need to be able to provide high quality streaming of church activities in the future.

If there are questions, concerns or ideas anyone would like to address to this committee, please reach out to me and I will be sure those thoughts are brought to the committee.

The GPUC Policy Manual defined our purpose as:


Statement of Purpose The Committee on Ministry shall focus on the health of the total ministry of the congregation.



- * The Committee is a group of caring and open lay people dedicated to the well-being of the congregation as a whole.
- * The Committee's role is to monitor all facets of the congregation as the congregation works in a spirit of mutual respect toward common goals.
- * The Committee's evaluation shall be guided by the church's Statement of Mission and Covenant.
- * The Committee shall give honest and pertinent feedback to the Board of Trustees, Minister, staff and other committees concerning their effectiveness in serving the congregation's total ministry.
- * The Committee is responsible for identifying issues within the congregation and, if necessary, suggesting a process for resolution and healing. The Committee itself is not responsible for resolving disputes.
- * The Committee shall report at least annually to the Board of Trustees regarding the health of the shared ministry.
