This year we will introduce our **OWL (Our Whole Lives)** classes for K-1 and Grades 4-6. There will be a required parent meeting in September. OWL is a positive, comprehensive, and age-appropriate educational program that promotes sexual health and is informed by the guidelines of the Sexuality Information and Education Council of the United States (SIECUS). The curriculum is based on four primary goals: to provide accurate, developmentally appropriate information; to increase self-esteem and understand relationships with and responsibilities toward others; to develop interpersonal skills including communication, decision making, and problem solving; and to teach responsibility for personal health and safety. The Board has been busy discussing and anticipating options from the Vision committee as to possible improvements, additions, and renovations to our church. Last year the Board approved retaining an architect and he has not only visited with the members of the vision committee, but with members of the congregation in order to assist us in determining our needs, dreams and what is possible. We anticipate a presentation to the congregation as soon as October followed by a decision from the congregation as to how to proceed. Will we renovate, expand or add a new building to replace the annex? These are exciting and challenging times for our congregation.

The Board spent a great deal of time also discussing how we can do a better job at growing our membership and retaining the people that do join. As our congregation ages, we need to build on new members that will provide both financial support and leadership in the future. This is an ongoing job, not just for the Board of Trustees and the Membership Committee, but for the whole congregation. When you see new members, please introduce yourself, ask their names and let them know they are welcome. You newest best friend may be the next newcomer through our doors.

The Board is always monitoring and planning for the financial health of our community. We need generous pledges from each membership unit to pay our bills. We also depend on other sources of income, such as the Resale Shop, fund raisers and rental income. We need to increase our pledges so we are not dependent on rental income that may change drastically from year to year. Among other things, the Board is considering an earlier start to our pledge efforts so that the annual Fellowship Dinner is truly a celebration of our financial security, rather than a plea for money.

We are blessed with a great Religious Education program but also have many other programs and ways for

each member to truly live as Unitarian Universalists. Adult Religious Enrichment includes programs on UU History, Spirituality and Philosophy. Committees are always looking for new members to help with Social Justice, Maintaining our Grounds, helping to grow Membership, work on Developing Leadership, working in our Resale Shop (Which makes a substantial contribution to our budget on an annual basis) and special fundraisers (such as our bi-annual auction and other activities).

The Board is also responsible for assisting our Minister in managing the church staff. Dr. Riegel is the supervisor of the R E Director, Music Director, Church Administrator and Custodian. Board officers meet regularly with Dr. Riegel regarding the staff and day to day operations of the church.
