Alexander's Meander

I listened to the short litany of dissatisfactions this person felt the need to share with me. When this person finished the litany of dissatisfied experiences I said, "That's not a really long list, which leads me to think that you have a longer list of things you enjoy about

your congregation?" This person responded in the affirmative, then went on with the "yea but..." addendum's... I listened further and then finally said, it sounds like your congregation's batting about 80% with you, which got an affirmative response. I went on to explain that if one is 80% satisfied with one's congregation, then one is batting 800, which by both baseball and congregation standards is really good!





The Safety Committee is finishing its first year of activity at GPUC. In the past year the committee has:

- Updated First Aid kits in the RE Wing, kitchen with trauma packs. The Resale Shop replaced the one in the Annex. Thank you Juli Moore.
- Placed additional signage for locating first aid kits and tornado shelter
- Purchased Fire blankets for the RE Wing, Kitchen and Annex
- Investigated installation of an additional Fire Alarm for the Sanctuary / Lobby area
- Researched installation of an electronic, monitored alarm system for the Sanctuary, RE Wing and Annex.
- Reminder announcements of the Exits in case of an Emergency, and location of Fire Extinguishers. List is posted on the bulletin board in the lobby.
