Message from the GPUC Board of Trustees

Now that our Vision Team has identified our congregation's hopes for the future, the Board is developing two teams to work on practical applications of our Vision. The first team, headed by Chris Vadino, will focus on identifying facilities improvements that will help us to reach our goals. Chris is in the process of building her team. The second team will focus on programming improvements to help us reach our goals. We are in the process of identifying a chair and members of that team.

The Board continues to work on projects that already have been identified.

Air-Conditioning: You have probably noticed some signs of construction in our main building. Installation of our new air-conditioning has finally begun. We hope to have cool air to support our summer programming this year! Thanks to all who brought this plan to fruition, including Veronica Smith and her team and John and Anne Roberts for their generous donation!!!

Landscaping: We have a landscape design for improving the Memorial Garden, Parking walkway, and our other grounds. Russ Chavey, our Grounds Chair, has worked with Candy Sweeney, designer, to bring us this plan. The Board authorized \$35,000 for Stage One of the Plan, which includes plantings, irrigation, drainage, and some changes to the gates and walls. The Board has been planning for this expenditure, so there is money available. The Board is planning to offer church members the opportunity of donating large trees for our grounds.

Communications/Marketing/Membership: The Board has authorized hiring a part-time support person to improve the effectiveness of our communications, including social media, publicity, audio-visual capacity. We are hoping this person will also give some time to our membership program as well. Money for such a position was anticipated in this year's Marketing budget.

Social Justice Event: The Board is sponsoring a lecture by the well-known speaker on Race Relations, Cornel West. Dr. West will speak at the War Memorial on April 8th on the subject, "Justice Matters". We hope to see everyone there. Please consider buying tickets to this event and please spread the word about this important speaker. Although we have already sold more than half of the tickets, we need to sell ALL the seats for this financial venture to break even. Let us continue to serve as a beacon of liberal thought on the East side!

Budget and Canvass: The Finance Committee and Board will begin working on a budget for the 2017-2018 Fiscal Year which starts July 1. After the Board approves the budget, the Congregation will get together to discuss and then will vote at our Annual Meeting in May. Thank you to Paul Rowady and Joe Buttiglieri, chairing Canvass, and thanks to Juli Moore, who is organizing the Fellowship Dinner. Please welcome their contacts with you, as they solicit pledges for the next year. Now, more than ever, liberal thought needs our support. Thank Goodness there is a UU church in Grosse Pointe. Our mission depends on the generosity of our congregation. I know I am happy to support this wonderful institution and community!

Crossroads Donations: Thank you to Jenny Marck and her family for their labor and organization of our monthly donations to Crossroads! Jenny has summarized our donations for 2016, which I thought would be of interest to the congregation. Please see below.

From Crossroads East Task Force, Jenny Marck:

During the 2016 calendar year, our donations to Crossroads East totaled 6,837 pounds. This represents the food and toiletry items donated on our FSFS Sundays, as well as the grocery items, deodorant, and toothpaste purchased with our monetary donations and my Kroger "bonus" money, which altogether totaled \$3,226.

The monetary contributions to FSFS have decreased markedly this year:

From Jan - March, 2016 \$1,015

From April - June, 2016 \$873

From July - September, 2016 \$734

From Oct - Dec, 2016 \$604


It seems that the reason for the decrease is fewer very large individual donations. The money from the actual FSFS Sunday collection and the money from the Alliance and Resale are consistent.

Brief Bio

Cornel West is a prominent and provocative democratic intellectual. He is a Professor of Philosophy and Christian Practice at Union Theological Seminary and Professor Emeritus at Princeton University. He has also taught at Yale, Harvard, and the University of Paris. Cornel West graduated Magna Cum Laude from Harvard in three years and obtained his M.A. and Ph.D. in Philosophy at Princeton. He has written over 20 books and has edited 13. Though he is best known for his classics, *Race Matters* and *Democracy Matters*, and for his memoir, *Brother West: Living and Loving Out Loud*, his most recent releases, *Black Prophetic Fire* and *Radical King*, were received with critical acclaim.

Religious Education News



We need to talk about families and loss. One of our individual families at GPUC recently lost their 20 year old daughter. We at GPUC lost that lovely young woman who was near and dear to us. Let's face it, it takes great love and courage to live life to its fullness. Every day we face a number of losses, big and small. We may lose money, our marriage is not good or our child is not doing well at school. We may be entering a new phase of our life with our child leaving for college or a partner becoming ill.

We all face changes every day and we may think we can get used to changes. The real picture is that we greet our losses with silence and anger, and they are scary. We don't want to feel the losses. Loss changes our world. Our life becomes painful. What to do?

While UU offers no detailed approach to facing loss, our 7 Principles lead quite naturally to beliefs about loss and our response to it. The information below is taken from "Taking It Home: Families and Faith". Go to uua.org for the full article. The following beliefs are widespread throughout our congregations:

- No one holds the ultimate truth about life, death, and the existence of the soul.
- We have the right to change our minds.
- We have the right to our individual opinions and beliefs.
- We believe that a deep reserve of strength exists with each of us.
- Every person has the courage and ability to contemplate the unknowable.
- Life is hard and loss is inevitable.
- Life is good and worth living.
- God (however one defines that concept) is characterized by love, not ultimate power.
- Our job is to live on earth with truth, beauty, and goodness.
- We can and do draw inspiration and strength from a wide variety of sources.
- There are no "chosen" people.
- UU's tend to accept scientific explanations of occurrences.
- Many UU's believe in "salvation by character", the way we live our lives today here on earth.

We can help each other during times of loss by: offering support through our Care Committee, recognizing the wrenching pain of loss, acknowledging differences of opinion in an atmosphere of respect and acceptance, sharing our emotions, both pleasant and painful, and "walking through the nettles" with each other.

If you need to talk regarding your losses, remember to call the staff at GPUC or Care Committee. We are here for you!!!

So as to avoid confusion between the Circle Circle Dinner put on by the Religious Education Department we have changed the name of the previously known Circle Dinners to Friendship Dinners.
