

Message from the GPUC Board of Trustees

We once again are looking forward to GPUC's Annual Meeting coming up in May, where the congregation will vote on approving a Budget for the 2017-2018 church year. The Finance Committee and Board have been busy formulating the budget which we will share with the congregation at an informational meeting on May 7. In preparation, we are anxiously awaiting more returns from our annual pledge drive, so we can have a better estimate of next year's potential income. If you have not yet responded to requests for pledge information, please do so quickly. Thanks to Paul Rowady, Joe Buttiglieri and Chuck Palmer for working on the Canvass appeal.

Our Annual Meeting is the cornerstone of our democratic process. We will summarize our past year, vote on approval of the GPUC Budget, vote in Board Trustees and officers, members of the Leadership Development Committee and members of the Committee on Ministry, as well as our Auditor. It is important that we all participate in this democratic process. Please plan to attend the Annual Meeting. All members in good standing will be eligible to vote. There are some minimum requirements that qualify members as being in good standing. Please see the relevant section of the Bylaws below. If you believe you may not be able to vote, based on the provisions of the By-laws, you can discuss your situation with Rev. Dr. Riegel. He can make recommendations to the Board about waiving requirements under some circumstances. We are a democratic society, and hope as many people as possible will attend the meeting and will vote. As always, members of the Board are also happy to address your concerns.

In other news, two task forces are charged with investigating methods of implementing improvements to our facilities and programming that were identified in our recent Vision Statement and process. Chris Vadino heads the Facilities Task Force, which is formed and has been meeting. John Artis will be heading the Programming Task Force, and is in the process of identifying potential members. In addition, the Board is considering the Landscaping Plan delivered by the planner we hired, Candy Sweeney. Russ Chavey is heading a Task Force to review the plan so as to develop proposals for the Board to begin implementing some initial improvements. Plantings for the Memorial Garden will probably comprise the first step. We are also hoping to have the Parking Lot Median/Walkway paved in the next few months.

All members in good standing are urged to attend this important meeting.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT VOTING.

Mark your calendar for our Annual Meeting in May, where we will hear a summary of the past year, vote for a new budget for 2017-2018, vote for Board of Trustees, Committee on Ministry, and Leadership Development Committees. According to our Bylaws, there are some requirements that need to be met in order to vote at the meeting. Please read the relevant section of the By-laws below. If you believe you may not be able to vote, based on the provisions of the By-laws, you can discuss your situation with Rev. Dr. Riegel. He can make recommendations to the Board about waiving requirements under some circumstances. We are a democratic society, and hope as many people as possible will attend the meeting and will vote. As always, members of the Board are also happy to address your concerns.

ARTICLE X - VOTING

- A. Voting and eligibility for elective office at any Annual or special meeting of the Society shall be limited to those Regular Members (defined previously in Article III) (a) who have been recorded as Members at a meeting of the Board of Trustees and (b) who have, as a matter of record on the books of the Society, contributed to the Society during the twelve (12) months completed before the month in which the meeting is held an amount sufficient to cover the current costs of membership in the Unitarian Universalist District of Michigan and the Unitarian Universalist Association. The requirement for a minimum monetary contribution may be waived by the Board upon the Minister's recommendation. Voting shall normally be by Members present at regularly or specially called meetings.*



The Abrahamic Faiths

It's hard to believe that our church school year is winding down so quickly! This year we have been studying the Abrahamic Faiths for the Lower through Senior High grades. Sunday, June 4, at 10:30 a.m. is our Religious Education Sunday. Please mark your calendars and join us to share our celebration of learning this past year. Our students will present a project from each class level. Also, our graduating seniors will share their "Statement of Faith" project. Sunday, May 14 is Mother's Day! The first Mother's Day was started by a tiny, red-haired, woman named Julia Ward Howe, who lived from 1819-1910. She was a Unitarian, who started the special day for all women, all over the world to work for PEACE. She believed that mothers should step up in the matters of wars. She believed in leaders using peaceful ways to settle problems. She started a festival which she named "Mother's Day," and she chose June 2 as the day of celebration. In 1906 a woman named Anna Jarvis proposed that Mother's Day be celebrated on a different day and the US Congress settled the matter by voting in 1913 for Mother's Day to be the second Sunday in May.

Julia Ward Howe is best remembered for writing the famous song, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" and for her stance against slavery. Julia wrote a Mother's Day Proclamation that you can read at www.peace.ca/mothersdayproclamation.htm As parents, we can share our UU faith on Mother's Day by teaching our children and reviewing our 7 Principles of Peace with the whole family.




