It's been a loooong and restful summer! And, like the meerkats in the above photo, I am eager to reconnect with my GPUC peeps! Already there are a number of things planned for this fall, of which I want to highlight two.

First, Linda Lawrence and I will be conducting a three part course entitled, *The Other Side*. In this course we will cover the phenomenon of near-death experience, afterlife communication, and reincarnation. Exact dates to be announced, with one class each in October, November, and December.

Second, since my arrival at GPUC I have been increasingly focusing on the social justice theme of antiracism. Most of you were here when I brought in Cornell West to speak at the War Memorial. And, I continue to sit on the Executive Committee of the local chapter of the NAACP. This coming year I would like to see our entire congregation more intentionally engage the theme of antiracism. Toward that end, our Social Justice committee, Adult Ed committee, and myself have planned a consciousness-raising format that we hope a large number of our congregation will engage throughout the year. Three times this year we will present different themes within the theme of antiracism. Each time we do this we will recommend a book, show a relevant film, then a lecture on by Dr. John Artis. Our first theme is housing discrepancy and our first book recommendation is, "The Color of Law," by Richard Rothstein (per Amazon: "Widely heralded as a "masterful" (Washington Post) and "essential" (Slate) history of the modern American metropolis, Richard Rothstein's The Color of Law offers "the most forceful argument ever published on how federal, state, and local governments gave rise to and reinforced neighborhood segregation"). Dr. Artis will present a lecture on this theme at noon on Sunday, Sept. 29th (Please mark your calendars!). In addition, we will also be showing the film, "13th", on Friday evening, Sept. 20th (Again, please mark your calendars!). The two themes that will follow throughout the year will be education, and, cultural discrepancies by race...

168 Hours in a week! Can you spare 1-2 for GPUC Religious Education?

On Sunday, **September 8, 2019**, we will be welcoming our students and parents back for our first all church service. I would like to share some thoughts with you about the book *168 Hours* by Laura Vanderkam. We have 168 hours in one week and where do you spend it and will one to two of those hours be at GPUC? Yes, we are starved for time for work, school, driving, cooking, shopping and cleaning. But when I think of our children's spiritual growth I think of GPUC Religious Education on Sunday mornings and the 1 to 2 hours a week is very important.

I heard our children state that church school is for where we light the chalice. Church is making friends, field trips, a place to do things and makes me feel special. Our church is beautiful, we get a treat, where we share our joys and concerns, collect food and money and where we go to learn about the UU ways and other religions. I also heard a child say, "We can't sleep in on Sunday mornings, but I think it is worthwhile!"

I hope you consider spending 1-2 hours of your 168 hours a week at GPUC. This year our hours of studying will be **Abrahamic Faiths**. Our classes will be studying Islam, Christianity and Judaism. Our **Lower Elementary**, **Upper Elementary** and **Juniors** will start in the church on September 15 and September 29 for the first 15 minutes.

Our **Juniors** this year will be meeting in the RE wing. Our Seniors are asked to attend church on September 8 with their families. Erica Phardel will be meeting with the seniors to discuss their first semester schedule.

The Schools Tutoring Committee needs a few more tutors for the teachers who have requested help for their students at the nearby Detroit Merit Academy on Alter and Jefferson. Most tutors volunteer once a week for an hour and a half in reading or in math at a day and time that is worked out between the tutor and the teacher. The children benefit from the extra attention and practice, and the tutor receives the reward of knowing that he or she has made a difference for another human being.

Margaret Hudson Collins has met with the same girls for two years to help them with class assignments and also enrich their knowledge of African American authors and cultural issues. Ruth Orintas usually tutors all the children in her assigned class and gives them mandarin oranges when they show their best efforts. The class rewarded her with a song of thanks at the end of the year.

Mary Zahler is a snowbird but faithfully appears every Fall and Spring to teach math to sixth graders. She attends the classroom lesson before tutoring to makes sure she and the teacher are taking the same approach to the problems. Emily Kraft works with first graders one at a time to give them the full attention new readers need. Some tutors request grade levels to work with and others fill in as needed, but all of us, both members and friends, feel welcomed and appreciated. Colin Gillis is tutoring first grade at Bunche School and is interested in starting a golf program, while Julie Panizzi is located at Clark School's second grade.
