



#### **Habitat for Humanity anyone?**

Our church participated for several years with Habitat for Humanity Detroit through an organization called Grosse Pointe Partners. GP Partners is a cooperative collaboration of several GP churches to provide volunteers to work on home building/improvement projects Habitat has in Detroit. GP Partners typically chooses one or two Saturdays a month and arranges for 10 or 15 volunteers to work at a building site. Folks who participate in this program can volunteer as often as they are willing and able, there is no requirement.

The person who coordinated this for GPUC is no longer a church member and when he left, our participation ended. GP Partners is asking us to please rejoin them and become active volunteers again. The Board of the church and the Social Justice Committee are looking for someone to be the liaison between GPUC and GP Partners. This would involve attending a meeting on the first Tuesday of the month (7 pm, rotating among the churches as hosts) to learn what is going on, and to represent our congregation's interests. Then that person would communicate to the congregation (via the newsletter, Thursday emails and/or the Sunday program insert) what the schedule is for volunteering, encouraging people to sign up to help on the scheduled Saturday and arranging for a group from GPUC to travel to the job site (when I did this it was always on the east side). In the past we would typically be on site for 3-4 hours and it was usually on a day when teens were allowed to work so we had several students from RE volunteering (I do not know if that is still part of the program).

No tools are required, they provide all the tools and equipment needed for whatever job is being done that day. I went with my daughters several times and while they had no special construction "skills," they would paint, caulk, assist with installing gutters or siding, etc. (holding things while watching and learning). Many times we would be working alongside the (eventual) homeowner which was very rewarding. So, if you might be interested in serving our church and the local community in this manner, please contact Candy in the church office.
