Gmail users should periodically check the "Promotions" and "Social" tabs. Many people do not realize that email servers often filter out "suspicious" email on your behalf, thereby confusing distribution list emails intended for you as spam.

Email Scam Alert

Email Scams Continue Targeting Church Congregations

Some GPUC members and friends once again are receiving suspicious email messages, appearing to be from Dr. Alex Riegel, asking for gift cards. These emails were not sent by Dr. Riegel. Please delete and do not reply to any suspicious message you may have received, appearing to be from Dr. Riegel, asking for money or gift cards.

This is a widespread scam that has been targeting church congregations all across the country. *UU World*, the magazine of the Unitarian Universalist Association, published an article in July, "<u>Gift Card Scammers Targeting Congregations</u>," which has a helpful and detailed explanation of the problem.

If you or anyone you know receives any messages like this, the most important thing to remember is that *Dr. Riegel would never ask congregants for money or to buy gift cards in this manner.*

You can identify scam messages by looking at the sender's email address. Suspicious messages may have Dr. Riegel's name on them, but the email address will be some variation of his official address, which is alexapuc@gmail.com. Any message that does not come from that address is not from Dr. Riegel.

A Message From Your Canvass Committee

Dear GPUC Members,

Last Sunday our former interim minister, Rev. Mitra Rahnema, gave a timely sermon, entitled, "Take Me to Church." She talked about how coming to church is a combination of liberation, redemption, and renewal. She talked about how church communities are not only special places for spiritual growth and renewal, but that churches save lives, and can positively impact their communities. She talked about how people make the church, not the other way around.

These ideas resonate with our Canvass theme of "What We Can Do, Depends on You." Your individual financial pledge of support for the next fiscal year will determine what we are able to do. As we are reminded frequently, by the good we do for each other, we are the church, and we are a church not defined by any one person, but by who we are, all of us together-a beloved community. The extent of your generosity will determine what our church community will be able to do next year.

There are several good ideas under consideration for what we could add:


- Developing PR tools, publications, banners and gear for our members to take to social justice events in our community,
- Working on PR strategies for spreading the word about our church as the liberal religious community on the east side,
- Providing child care for all church events,
- Bringing nationally known speakers to our community.


To do more than maintain the status quo, our members need to pledge more. If you look at the pie charts on the reverse of this letter, you will see that current pledges of \$273,500 provide only 67% of our \$395,000 budget. With the loss of the City of Grosse Pointe rental income next fiscal year, increasing our pledge income becomes even more important. Our goal for next year is to increase total pledges 15%, to a total of \$314,500. If GPUC were a restaurant, don't you think we'd merit a nice tip?

We are a voluntary organization that relies on the generosity of our members. We can't compel you to give generously, we don't intend to shame you into giving more, we can only ask that you support our community to the fullest extent possible. What we can do next year, depends entirely on you. We hope to see you at the **Fellowship Dinner**, **Saturday March 7th**. Members at the dinner will have the opportunity to make their pledges there. We will then be following up with the rest of our members in the following weeks.


