- You will then be asked whether you wish to join the "meeting" with your device audio and device camera.
  - If you do not want others to see what you are wearing at that moment, you can join without activating your camera.
  - Throughout the service, all participants besides the worship leaders will be muted to prevent background noises (barking dogs, ringing phones, etc.) from being included in the worship service.



## **Notice of Annual Meeting of Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church**

The annual meeting of the congregation of Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church will take place on **Sunday**, **May 17**<sup>th</sup> **at 1pm**. This year's meeting will be held electronically via zoom due to the social distancing requirements currently in place secondary to the Governor's executive order.

The Leadership Development Committee has prepared a slate of candidates to be nominated as chairs of the standing committees, church auditor, president and vice-presidents of the Board of Trustees, committee on ministry and the leadership development committee.

## **GPUC 2020-2021 Proposed Budget**

At this year's annual meeting on May 17 a major item will be the approval of the budget for fiscal year 2020-2021. The COVID-19 pandemic has had a major impact on our budget both this year and next. To help the congregation understand the budget we have recorded a video explaining it and will have a **Zoom call to review the budget at 7 PM on Tuesday May 5th.** We ask that you review the video and provide any questions to Rudy Wedenoja at treasurergpuc@gmail.com prior to the May 5 meeting.

We are expecting a 15% decline in our income in the new fiscal year. As a result, we are eliminating our contributions to the Capital Reserve Fund and have cut the operating budget by 4%. Even with these actions we still have pandemic associated risks in our budget.

It is our hope that with the budget video and a review session on May 5 we will be able to address all your questions and have a quick approval at the annual meeting.

### Update from Congresswoman Debbie Dingell

Much of time in the last few days has been spent with the manufacturing sector in particular the autos, suppliers and the UAW focused on workers' health and safety. It is clear that more and more PPE equipment is going to be needed first for hospitals and frontline workers, but all workers as the economy begins to start up. Our country is in the middle of the worst worker safety crisis in recent history. If we are to open the economy any time soon, we must have standards in place that keep workers safe. Congresswoman Tlaib and I are working with House leadership, labor and manufacturers to ensure all future coronavirus legislation puts worker safety first.

Michigan is expanding its COVID-19 testing capacity to give those with mild symptoms access to testing. Start by calling your healthcare provider or contacting a testing site. Testing site numbers and locations can be found here. Testing, testing, is how we will get things back to normal.

If you are not experiencing systems and don't need to be tested, the best thing you can do is stay home. This is real. We've seen the number of cases decline but that's because people are doing a good job staying home. We're not out of the woods yet but progress is being made and people are doing what's right.
