Comments from Dr. Alexander Riegel

The Holiday Season is Upon Us!

It is hard to believe how fast time is moving. The Thanksgiving holiday has already passed and Christmas is only a few weeks away. Before we know it it will be the year 2016! Time seems to be racing and us along with it. Perhaps one way to slow time down a bit is to stop and pause - to take in the seasons that are upon us - to consider the themes of thanksgiving and rebirth.

I know I say it a lot but it is true. I am deeply grateful to be able to serve Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church. And, we are experiencing - together - a rebirth of sorts. It is an exciting time to be at GPUC and I believe we are on the verge of a vital and long term ministry together.

When you stop and pause and consider the themes of Thanksgiving and rebirth in your life, what gets on your radar? Take a moment and reflect upon this...

On another note, I want to remind people that there is a bit of a cultural shift taking pace at GPUC in regard to our "church year." Message from the GPUC Board of Trustees

This year marks the 50th anniversary of our beautiful double-circle building. The Board has been diligently working on identifying potential improvement projects for our building and grounds. We held a retreat last week where we identified those projects that we would like to begin this church year:

1) We believe we have the funds to work on the Memorial Garden and Parking lot Walkway. A landscape designer is busy drawing up potential plans for these areas as well as the rest of the grounds. We would implement these enhancements in stages.

2) The Board believes we have funds to purchase updated audio-visual equipment for the Sanctuary. This equipment will enhance Sunday services and other events held in the Sanctuary.

3) We have received quotes on adding air-conditioning to the sanctuary and other areas of the building, as well as quotes for updating our entire HVAC system. As this is a large expenditure, the Board will come to the congregation to discuss the plan and request the congregation's approval. Stay tuned for meetings in the spring.

At the retreat, the need to develop a GPUC Vision was discussed. Understanding what we want our church to become over the next 5 to 10 years will require the input of the entire congregation. This Vision and the direction we want the church to take affects all aspects of our operation from Sunday services to physical plant improvements. Stay tuned for upcoming meetings and workshops where we will develop this Vision together! This is an exciting time in the life of GPUC.

The Board welcomes our newest Trustee, George Robert (Rob) Lyles. He is already a wonderful addition to the Board!

Movie Discussion Evening at GPUC *Waking Life* Friday, December 4th at 6 pm in the Annex

Pizza, salad, and wine will be served before viewing the film. Following the film we will take a short break for dessert and coffee then regather for a discussion of the film, led by Dr. Riegel.

SYNOPSIS:

Waking Life is an animated story about a nameless young man, played by Wiley Wiggins, who finds himself trapped in a continuous series of dreams. He walks or levitates from one scene to another, listening to a range of theories by philosophers, intellectuals, and crackpots. The text commentary to the film states that Waking Life features a complex interweaving of conversations with professors, artists, writers, and performers. There is no single theory behind the film. Rather the film is an exploration from many points of view of past and current trends in philosophy.

The principal plot to the story is that Wiley returns to Austin, Texas after a trip, is dropped off at a random location in town and subsequently hit by a car. During the first half of the film he listens to various people's theories about human existence, saying very little himself. In the second half of the film Wiley realizes that he is stuck in a series of lucid dreams and he attempts to "wake up." As his efforts fail he considers that he may in fact be dead and experiencing a dream-like condition in the afterlife.

Director Richard Linklater states in the DVD filmmaker's commentary that all of the ideas expressed in the movie should be accessible to viewers, even though the dialog is conceptually dense. Several of the exchanges were from ideas developed for his previous movies, which were left out of those projects for various reasons. Other exchanges were generated from the actual views of the professionals or intellectuals who appear. About half of this movie's content, he stated, is intentionally philosophical.

The film is available on DVD from Netflix and is available for streaming on You Tube.

First Sundays at noon - Mystic Poet Workshops: In these workshops we will utilize a method of dream interpretation in order to use mystic poetry as a tool for personal and spiritual growth. In small group settings we will examine one poem per month, collectively sharing our personal insights into the possible meanings of these poems. Poets include the likes of Rumi, Hafez, Mary Oliver, Goethe, Kabir, Lalla, etc.

Third Sundays at noon - Meditation: This is an introduction to meditation course with mini lectures, Q & A, an introduction to various meditation techniques, and 30 minutes of silent meditation per class. We will begin by working with the book "The Attention Revolution: Unlocking the Power of the Focused Mind," by Alan Wallace.

Fourth Sundays (excluding December) at noon - Philosopher's Club: In this class we will do Philosophy on par with an introductory college level class. Currently we are continuing our study of "The Consolation of Philosophy," by Boethius. In Nov. we will review book 1 and discuss book 2. In January we will discuss book 3. (Meets in the sanctuary.)
