Have you noticed what a good job our Director of Religious Education, Julie Artis does in posting to our official GPUC Facebook page? Nearly every day, and sometimes more than once a day, Julie shares uplifting thoughts, nuggets of wisdom, or information from our District and Association. Recently she shared a quotation by Marvin Ashton. Part of that quotation reads as follows: "Leave people better than you found them."

This reminds me of the sermon I did a few Sundays back on the topic of shame. In that sermon I talked about the fact that, though we are wont to admit it, we look to others in hopes of receiving messages of affirmation; indicators that we are acceptable in their eyes. This tendency to allow ourselves to be defined by the gaze of the other begins in infancy, with our primary caretaker(s).

Given this, in my sermon I suggested that we hold a great deal of power relative to one another. The gaze we give another speaks volumes about how we feel in regard to that person while the gaze the other receives goes a great way toward determining his/her inner experience (especially when one receives the same gaze from people in general). An antidote to shame, then, I suggested, is to gaze at others affirmatively - with love, compassion, and understanding.

As the new year turns I want to suggest that we each be more intentional about our gaze. I want to suggest that we remain cognizant of the power we hold relative to one another. I want to suggest that we consider looking with love, compassion and understanding upon other people as a spiritual practice. Doing so we can help people feel affirmed, included, and valued. We can leave people better than we find them, with a look, a touch, a word... a blessing.

- Roscoe the Clown for the kids early in the evening



On Fridays, January 23 and 30 John Artis will lead a two part discussion on the book, <u>The Heart of Whiteness: Confronting Race, Racism and White Privilege</u> by Robert Jensen. This short, but powerful book attempts to rearrange the Race question from one dealing with racial minorities to one dealing with whites and white privilege as the Problem facing our country. The author examines personal experience, data, and theory and uses them for examining race and racism in America.



On Fridays, February 27 and March 6 the discussion continues with, <u>Reproducing Racism</u> by Daria Roithmayr. This powerful book examines how everyday choices we make without any intention of doing so lock in white advantage in America. She examines the locked in system beginning with Jim Crow and demonstrates how it is now a self-reinforcing and perhaps troubling permanent economic class system in America.
