

Autumn is my favorite time of year! It may portend icy cold days, but its soft sunlight still brings warmth to the skin while the cool nights can make one huddle - shivering. In autumn we are caught between extremes; there is a certain tension inherent in change.

There has been a lot of change at GPUC this past year. We have ridden a wave of incredible energy. Where we now find ourselves is in a very different place than the last time the leaves turned color and took their place upon the ground. It has been an exciting time!

That said, we are still in the midst of change, or perhaps still at the beginning... Yet already there is a palpably different atmosphere settling in at GPUC. The shift we might feel as that wave of incredible energy begins to ebb, as invariably it must, will reveal the challenges, and sometimes tensions, inherent in change. In short, we are shifting to the more pragmatic demands that change makes: day-to-day decision-making, day-to-day hard work, day-to-day relationship building, etc.

Our church will be installing Rev. Dr. Alex Riegel on Sunday, September 27th at 4:00 p.m. This will be a meaningful ceremony for our students of the Religious Education Program to witness. We would like all families with their children to participate in this service. Our youth choir will be singing and the nursery will be open for our young UU's.



We have our past and our tradition and Rev. Dr. Alex Riegel will continue our future as our new installed minister. Please join our GPUC church family on Sunday, September 27th at 4:00 p.m.

We work hard to empower our young UU's to care and then to act in our community and our world. One of the ways we encourage caring at GPUC Religious Education program is through our KIDS WHO GIVE project. We ask each child to donate some time in our community between September and June. The parents and students can find a chart on the bulletin board in the RE wing to keep track of their hours served and activity donated. Our suggested hours are as follow: ten hours for Senior and Juniors; eight hours for Upper Elementary students; and five hours for Lower Elementary Students. Students can change the world by tutoring at an after school program, visiting nursing homes, masking cards for shut-ins, or doing the dishes for grandparents or a special friend. The students can bring in food and toiletries to our church. The goods are taken each month to Crossroads in Detroit. The students can help an older couple by raking their yard, carrying packages, or reading a favorite book to them. Who knows, they may get to enjoy an afternoon with milk and cookies. Service fosters empathy, understanding, and compassion. Our students who choose service can grow in confidence, responsibility and leadership. We are never too young to believe in our power to make a difference!

Religious Education Lessons

All classes will be studying Unitarian Universalism for the coming year. The classes will begin with developing their class rules and setting the stage on how they will treat each other during the year.

The GPUC nursery will be open at 9:30 a.m. every week for our very young UU's.

October 1, Christina Soliz, East Michigan Field Organizer Planned Parenthood Advocates & Affiliates of Michigan

The (Actual) Truth about Planned Parenthood

Planned Parenthood is under attack. Anti-abortion extremists calling themselves the Center for Medical Progress have released a number of heavily edited videos attacking Planned Parenthood in order to deceive the public. Planned Parenthood is the most trusted women's health care provider in this country. They provide everything from birth control, to lifesaving cancer screenings, to safe abortion, and other high-quality health care for nearly 100 years. One in five American women reports having been to Planned Parenthood for care. Planned Parenthood's medical providers and staff are among the best in the country. Christina Soliz will discuss all of the services provided by Planned Parenthood both in the community and in the health centers.

October 8, Dr. John Artis presents: The Corporate effort to take control of American Public Schools

An Analysis by John Burl Artis, PhD

Beginning in 1983 with the publication of A Nation at Risk, a scathing report of supposed failure of American public schools, the public schools and public school teachers have been under attack by the twin partners of Corporate America and national and state governments. This attack has led to a concerted takeover of curriculum, local control of teacher evaluation, testing of students to determine what should be learned, and a steady diet of school budget reductions and reallocation to Charter Schools and other alternative schooling schemes.

Audiences for this presentation will enjoy an opportunity to listen to an analysis of the thirty plus years of corporate and governmental assault on public education by Dr. Artis. They will also have an opportunity to engage in significant discussion about what steps could be taken to halt these attacks on our public schools.

October 15, Laura Wagner presents: The M1 Rail Project

The M1 RAIL Project is 3.3 miles of embedded track, 22 stations and 2 bridge replacements. This uniquely funded project, with 60% private donations, consists of 2 segments. The City of Detroit Segment 1 is off-line, meaning no overhead wires, and is track with an asphalt overlay on the road. The MDOT portion is full reconstruct, meaning demolition of the existing road, sometimes removing old trolley tracks, track, sidewalk roadway, signals and street lighting. This project, employing mostly Detroiters, has already had an impact on the rebirth of this beautiful, diverse city, with overall positive feedback from the citizens. The presentation will be a visual tour of the project from one end to the other.

October 22, Jerry Herron presents: Living with Detroit: An All-Purpose History of America

Detroit is the most American spot on Planet Earth. Everything that makes us who we are has gone further and faster here than anywhere else, for both good and ill, from the meteoric rise of this city in the twentieth century to its collapse in the following century. And now, there's the comeback. When America happens, Detroit is the result; it's not so much a city as a revelation. So our history as a people is the history of our trying to learn how to live with Detroit.

October 29, Jade Nabbouh presents: First World Problems - Leaving Islam

This discussion aims to explore the experience of North American Muslims who leave the Islamic faith. Religious trauma is certainly an issue that is common to apostates of many religions; however, formerly practicing Muslims seldom openly share their experience or even identify themselves as converts or non-religious due to the social, cultural, and sometimes physical consequences that threatens them. This speaker will share his experience and that of others (anonymously) who have left Islam, and discuss the issues surrounding apostasy as well as the need for open criticism and advocacy from within the Muslim-American

Sunday Adult Education Classes

Beginning in October Rev. Alex will hold adult education sessions at noon on the first, third and fourth Sundays of the month. Sessions will be held in the Sanctuary.

First Sundays at noon - Mystic Poet Workshops: In these workshops we will utilize a method of dream interpretation in order to use mystic poetry as a tool for personal and spiritual growth. In small group settings we will examine one poem per month, collectively sharing our personal insights into the possible meanings of these poems. Poets include the likes of Rumi, Hafez, Mary Oliver, Goethe, Kabir, Lalla, etc.

Third Sundays at noon - Meditation: This is an introduction to meditation course with mini lectures, Q & A, an introduction to various meditation techniques, and 30 minutes of silent meditation per class. We will begin by working with the book "The Attention Revolution: Unlocking the Power of the Focused Mind," by Alan Wallace.

Fourth Sundays (excluding November and December) at noon - Philosopher's Club: In this class we will do Philosophy on par with an introductory college level class. Our first study will be "The Consolation of Philosophy," by Boethius (Penguin Classics is the recommended version). Following that we will explore "Flatland," by Edwin Abbot, "Teddy," by J. D. Salinger, The Myth of Sisyphus, by Albert Camus, and many other Philosophical works.

Do you want to explore challenging spiritual themes in a confidential, small-group setting? Chalice Circles provide that opportunity. Groups of 8-10 meet monthly and are led by trained facilitators.

This year we will be using a curriculum titled "Finding Balance: Living with Polarities" that was developed at the UU Church in Eugene, Oregon. Life involves many polarities and paradoxes, both within an individual and within groups. These polarities can be seen as differences and preferences to be recognized and managed, rather than problems to be solved. Each end of the polarity has its own advantages and value, as well as disadvantages and liabilities. In our sessions we will be sharing some of our attempts at finding balance living with polarities, embracing "both and", rather than "either/or".

Medicine has triumphed in modern times, transforming birth, injury, and infectious disease from harrowing to manageable. But in the inevitable condition of aging and death, the goals of medicine seem too frequently to run counter to the interest of the human spirit. Nursing homes, preoccupied with safety, pin patients into railed beds and wheelchairs. Hospitals isolate the dying, checking for vital signs long after the goals of cure have become moot. Doctors, committed to extending life, continue to carry out devastating procedures that in the end extends suffering.
