We walk within and among all that is sacred. This is the new revolution that can lead to revolution - if we can only manage to remember...

Peter Mayer, a wonderful folk musician whom we should invite to GPUC, has a beautiful song along these lines. It is entitled Everything Is Holy Now. It contains beautiful wisdom, like this:

When holy water was rare at best,
It barely wet my fingertips,
But now I have to hold my breath,
Like I'm swimming in a sea of it.
It used to be a world half there,
Heaven's second rate hand-me-down,
But I walk it with a reverent air,
Cause everything is holy now.

Message from the GPUC Board of Trustees

I just got home from our wonderful pot luck lunch. I am so grateful we have each other! GPUC has been a comfort following the election, and has helped me begin to regain my hopeful outlook. I hope everyone has a wonderful Thanksgiving and holiday season! Here are some issues the Board has been considering.

- Fundraising: BIDDING STARTS ON OUR ONLINE MINI-AUCTION on Sunday 11/27 at 12:01am. PLEASE CHECK OUT THE CATALOG on www.32auctions.com/gpuc2016. Despite the list of wonderful items donated by our members and others, the mini-auction can only be successful if you bid!!! Please bid high and bid often!
- We are grateful that Juli Moore has agreed to coordinate the Fellowship Dinner this Spring as part of our canvass process. Thank you Juli!
- Coffee: We are seeking a new Coffee Coordinator! As of December 4th, we will not have anyone to
 monitor the volunteers making coffee on Sundays. Leadership Development is working on a possible
 solution starting in January, but that is not yet firm. Meanwhile, we have at least a month not
 covered. We sent out a plea to the congregation, but as yet have not had a response.
- Foyer: You may have noticed furniture changes in the Foyer. We hope to make more space and

- better traffic flow for coffee hour. Margo Bishop and Susan Hartz will be looking at ways to beautify the area while maintaining a larger space.
- The Vision survey is complete and the Vision Task Force has presented us with a tentative Vision Statement. Please attend the congregational meeting on December 4th.
- Building: The air conditioning project is moving forward. Our contractor has met with tradespeople. The Board authorized signing the contract and a deposit check. There have been efforts to repair our front door locking system, but the repair was unsuccessful. Veronica Smith has arranged for the Village Locksmith to assess the problem.
- Grounds: Russ Chavey will bring a landscaping proposal to the Board in December. The landscape designer has finished her recommendations. Russ informs us that efforts to pave the center island walkway in the parking lot will wait until spring, due to problems.
- Membership: Twelve interested people attended the New U class on Oct.16th. Sonja Franchett and Suzanne Ross are planning these educational sessions quarterly.
- The Board has approved bringing the renowned author and speaker on racial issues, Cornel West, to Grosse Pointe for a speaking engagement in April. This will be a joint venture with the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. Thank you Dr. Riegel for researching and recommending this significant event. We are very excited about the opportunities that such an event will offer in terms of furthering our social justice goals and increasing the wider community's awareness of GPUC.


