

I am sorry if you missed the Brother Sun concert the other night but for those of you who were able to make it, weren't they great?! I am already talking to them about a return visit to kick off next year...

Otherwise, there are several things to which I look forward this year:

- 1) My one day spiritual study and practice retreats. This is an opportunity to take a deeper dive into spiritual matters with me, starting with the one day retreat, Knocking from the Inside (see event description later in this newsletter), during which we will explore the Sufi tradition and have an opportunity to engage more deeply in spiritual practice together.
- 2) The November visit by Russill Paul (see event description later in this newsletter). Russill, as many of you know, is a friend and mentor of mine and leads the pilgrimage on which I go from time to time at Shantivanam, an ashram in Tamil Nadu, India. - 3) OUR VISION PROCESS As you should know by now, we are launching a vision process that is vital to the short and midterm direction of our shared ministry. I am very excited about this because I see it as the articulation of our shared ministry concerning which I am incredibly optimistic! I continue to have great hope and confidence in our ability to accomplish a great deal together and see this as the starting point for the next stage in our ministry together. Please do your best to participate during this process, beginning with the congregational meeting(s) following service October 2nd OR (not and) the congregational meeting Monday evening, October 10th. (Again, see later in this newsletter for details about this process and these meetings.)

Finally, I want to reiterate how honored and humble I feel to be serving as your minister. You are a fantastic group of folk and GPUC is a fantastic place for my continued growth as a minister.

Message from the GPUC Board of Trustees

How nice to finally have Autumn with a crisp sunny day as I write this. I had a wonderful time listening to Brother Sun last Thursday evening and saw many of you there. Now, I'm looking forward to our Committee Fair on 9/25, and hope many of you will check out volunteer opportunities. Thanks to Karen Webb and the Leadership Development team for organizing this event!

Paul Rowady has stepped down from his position as Chair of Endowment which he has held for several years. We thank him for generously lending his financial expertise to GPUC's investment decisions, and are happy that he will continue to contribute as Board Secretary. For the time-being, the Finance committee will supervise the investments. We will explore the future of the Endowment Committee in Finance and the Board. Second, we will very soon be celebrating the years that Jill Crane served our adult religious education as Director and later Assistant. Thank you for your dedication, Jill. Jill has moved on to chairing the Fellowship Committee, and we look forward to seeing some fun ideas for fellowship!

HVAC UPDATE: On February 7, 2016, the GPUC congregation authorized the Board of Trustees to spend up to \$130,000 to add air-conditioning to the sanctuary, gallery and vestibule. Following that meeting, an HVAC task force was formed under Veronica Smith, our Building Chair, including several engineers from our membership. The task force researched our facility and recommended hiring a supervisory engineer for the project, which we did. In conjunction with the task force, the engineer drew up technical plans. We have received 2 bids for this job. The lower bid, by a large margin, is for \$119,000 and excludes the electrical work

that will need to be done. It is possible that the electrical work could cost an additional \$20,000. Therefore, the cost of air-conditioning will exceed the amount the congregation has authorized by approximately \$10,000.

At this time, it is necessary for the Board to come back to the congregation to authorize the additional funds necessary for the air-conditioning project. We would like to hold a brief meeting on October 16th immediately after the church service.

When we initially proposed this project, we were in high hopes that it would be complete by now, and early in the research process we also had hope of a lower cost. However, several impediments have delayed the process. We had difficulty finding an engineer to supervise our project and then we also had difficulty finding companies that would bid on the project. We have been told that there is a shortage of tradespeople in Southeast Michigan since the economic downturn in 2008. There is high demand with the economy improving, and low supply. This situation has driven up the price of labor. Our preferred bidder expressed his surprise at the high cost of labor at this time.

Please attend the **Congregational Meeting following service on October 16th**. Your voice is important in our democratic process. We will be glad to answer questions at that time, or you can always contact me.

Religious Education News



The traditional church school is in full swing. We work hard to empower our young UU's in our classes to care and then to act in our community and our world. One of the ways we encourage caring at GPUC/RE program is through our Kids Who Give project. We ask each child to donate some time and material goods in our community between September and June.

We all need to inspire giving and the spirit of giving. The past years have shown us on TV/natural disasters, terrorist attacks around the globe and terrible images of suffering and pain. We want to teach our children lessons of charity as a way of life. We must start while they are young. How does this become a habit to give? We suggest the following hours for service and giving: high schoolers-10 hours a month, juniors-10 hours, upper elementary-8 hours and lower elementary-5 hours a month. Some suggestions on how to implement this are to ask your children to help their neighbors, donate clothes, toys and books, on their birthdays donate in their name to a local charity, donate to the humane society, volunteer at church, donate food to our food collection each month and continue to seek other ways to help.

Teach your children that volunteering and charity is not just for emergencies. In order for it to become a habit it is good to do something every month. It will become a way of life, rather than a moment when something big happens. When you give to others you give to yourself and your family.

Religious Education Lessons

All classes will be studying Abrahamic Faiths for this church year. The classes are beginning with developing their class rules and setting the stage on how they will treat each other during the year.


