

Message from the GPUC Board of Trustees

I was very happy to greet a new Board of Trustees at our first Board Meeting of this new Church Year. Welcome to our new Board Members: Joe Buttiglieri as VP, Paul Rowady as Secretary, Christine Whitwell, and Janna Sendra! Many thanks to our leaving Board members Ed Marck, Ann Helm, Rob Lyles and Suzanne Ross. We will miss your valuable insights.

This year, the Board has a number of goals that will require the congregation's support and participation. We are hoping to grow in numbers and programs which will require changes in our governing and committee structures, and possibly changes to our physical plant.

- We have just begun to take some preliminary steps to streamline our committee structure by encouraging groupings of committees to meet with each other. We are hoping these groups will be able to identify ways they can support each other, communicate better, and possibly work together on tasks.
- The air-conditioning project is moving forward a bit more slowly than we had initially hoped. The team
 under Veronica Smith has thoroughly researched and drawn up a plan with the help of an expert in this
 area. It has taken some time, but we now have 2 bids from contractors. The HVAC team and
 engineer are reviewing the bids and will make a recommendation to the Board soon.
- We are still hoping to obtain landscape design recommendations for grounds' improvements. Thanks to Russ Chavey for working on this. Efforts are in the works for paving the island walkway in the parking lot. Russ is in the process of receiving bids.
- Plans are in process for improving our audio-visual capabilities.
- We have a Vision team headed by Chris Vadino, which is developing a process, building on our mission statement, to define a shared GPUC vision for the future.
- As a congregation we must put more energy into the mechanisms that support growth including the following excellent committees:
 - The Membership Committee, We must all help in the recruitment of new members and getting them involved at GPUC.
 - The Leadership Development Committee in identifying and recruiting new leaders for our bustling community. A Committee Fair is being planned for September or October.
 - The Fellowship Committee in their efforts to provide fellowship activities that help us to bond as a community.
 - The RE program; historically one of our strongest enablers for growth.
 - The Social Justice Committee and Adult Education Committees as they continue to build these programs.
 - The Buildings and Grounds committees are the gateway and the physical image of our church.
 - $_{\odot}$ $\,$ Building tools for publicizing and marketing our activities to the wider community.
 - Creating an atmosphere more conducive to socializing during our coffee hour.

Finally, let me introduce our new committee leaders: We want to celebrate the addition of a new team

member at the Resale Shop. Amy Thelen has agreed to co-chair with Margo Bishop and has innovative ideas for marketing Resale products! Thanks, Amy! Jill Crane will be taking over as chair of that committee and we hope Courtney, Jerry and Barb will continue to work with her. Fellowship is a big job and an important one and we must put more energy (and people) in that direction. Thanks, Jill for taking on this responsibility and thanks for your many years of devoted service to our church as Adult Religious Education Director and Assistant.

A Vision for GPUC

We've Been Busy Visionearing!

At the end of last year the Board appointed a vision team to begin the work of helping our congregation create a vision for our beloved community. That vision will be a statement that describes what we want to achieve as a congregation over the next five years. The group has met several times this summer and is now at the point where it is time to engage the congregation and begin the process. That effort will begin with a questionnaire (to be released Sunday, Sept. 11) about various topics, largely aimed at ascertaining where the congregation feels our collective efforts should be put in service of our shared ministry. Please take the time to complete this questionnaire. Your input is vital to this effort!

In short, the vision team will be ascertaining the congregation's perspective on a number of topics, ranging from your perspective of the demographics where we do our ministry to your personal aspirations for GPUC. That is, the vision team will guide the congregation through a process in which the vision statement itself reflects the congregation's understanding and desire for how we shape our ministry.

Once the vision team has compiled your responses to the questionnaire, it will use that information as the basis for further engagement with congregation over the course of this Fall, in the form of a few congregational and small group meetings. This will not be an onerous and drawn out task but similar to our successful Mission Statement efforts last year, engaging, informative and fun. Indeed, this is an exciting time to be talking to one another about what our vision ought to be and what we would like the future to hold for our beloved community.

Finally, we introduce you to the vision team, which has adopted the title, "GPUC VisionearTeam." The play on words is intended to emphasize our role as listeners and facilitators. We are: Chris Vadino (Chair), Pi Irwin, Russ Chavey, and John Artis (Dr. Riegel sits on the committee in his role as our minister.).


