Alexander's Meander



"We have the power to hold no opinion about a thing and not to let it upset our state of mind - for things have no natural power to shape our judgments." - Marcus Aurelius - Meditations

Those of you who have been following my recent blog posts on the wisdom of the Stoics know that I have had the ancient Greeks (and a few Romans) on my mind lately. Recently, I have been rolling around this piece of wisdom from Marcus Aurelius. Aurelius' suggestion that we not hold opinions runs counter to the very nature of the mind, for the mind's job is to gather information and draw conclusions based on that information. That mental ability is responsible for everything from our ancestors managing not to get eaten by tigers to our modern ability to send humans into space. Opinion making seems to be among the mind's primary duties...

So, can we manage not to hold opinions, as Aurelius' suggests? Well, it is very difficult, to say the least (Trust me. I've tried it many times!). It is very much like not breathing - eventually we are going to take that breath! Likewise, eventually we are going to form that opinion! So, here are a few tricks to help us out:

- 1. Remember that we almost always form opinions on the basis of partial data. That is, once we have enough data that corresponds to our personal predispositions, we feel satisfied that we have all the data we need to form an opinion. That is not necessarily (not even usually) the case. So, it would behoove us to remember to gather more data than we already have ESPECIALLY data that might disconfirm our predispositions. This might mean rarely, if ever, being in a position to form an opinion.
- 2. Remember the piece of Taoist wisdom that I shared in my sermon on Taoism quite a ways back: "Do you have the patience to wait for the mud to settle and your vision to become clear?" That's a lot of patience, which in many circumstances may also mean rarely, if ever, being in a position to form an opinion.
- 3. The universe unfolds with a great deal more intelligence than we usually have to offer. Rather than form opinions, we should learn to discern what is unfolding naturally before us. That way we can take action in life by reading the signs of the times rather than molding life as we see fit based on our opinions.

Finally, is not having opinions really worth all that effort? The quick answer is, most often, yes, because not having opinions allows genuine truth eventually to emerge, not to mention that holding partial or false opinions, which most of our opinions are, can create a great deal of mental and emotional upset, robbing us of the innate joy of life.

So, now, I wonder, what is your opinion about my opinion about Aurelius' opinion about opinions?

Message from the GPUC Board of Trustees



Cornel West graduated Magna Cum Laude from Harvard in three years and obtained his M.A. and Ph.D. in Philosophy at Princeton. He has written over 20 books and has edited 13. Though he is best known for his classics, Race Matters and Democracy Matters, and for his memoir, Brother West: Living and Loving Out Loud, his most recent releases, Black Prophetic Fire and Radical King, were received with critical acclaim.

March 19, 1939 our GPUC Founding Statement reads:

We unite for the purpose of creating a church home for **ourselves**, and our **children**, to which we can welcome all of like spirit, and from which we can send out an enlightened and uplifting influence into the world.

We believe in and would be guided by the universal principles of religion and morality as interpreted by the growing knowledge and conscience of mankind.

We invite to our fellowship all who sympathize with our ideas, who are helped by our worship, or who wish to work with us in promoting human welfare.

I will be sharing these words with our students this Sunday. I will be telling the story about when church was started and why. Our founders were hungry and thirsty to have a church home to unite for themselves and their children. They sought out religious freedom and together with other UU's helped develop in their journey our seven principles.

Help your children with their hunger and thirst by attending church regularly. Help yourself by listening to

the sermons and then asking, "How can I be of service to GPUC?". We have a lot of jobs that need your help and hands. Ask yourself if you want this church to continue. Make a monetary pledge and teach your children how to give. Attend our workshops, help in RE by teaching, writing curriculum, buying snacks, cleaning the closets and meeting our new parents.

Realize that your hunger and thirst will be fed by connecting with others. You will start to see your deeper needs, your spirit soar when in fellowship with others. I found the UU church 38 years ago and it has fed my soul ever since!


