



GPUC Steeple Roof Update

On your next visit in our sanctuary, gaze up at the upper windows and ledge area. The buckets, which have been a part of our sanctuary for the past 30 plus years, have been removed! The steeple roofing project, which has been ongoing during the month of October, is complete.

From the outside of the church, you will see new copper flashing around the steeple edge along with new copper cladding on the lower section of the steeple beams.

The steeple roofing project involved removing all of the original steeple copper roofing material that was used on the flat section of the steeple roof and beams up to a rise height on the steeple roof of about two feet. The original copper roofing material was replaced with a rubber roof and rigid insulation. The roof and the beams were sealed with the rubber roofing material. A decorative copper cap was added to the outer surface of the roof beams on top of the rubber roof to blend in with the remaining steeple copper cladded roof beams.


With time, the new copper will turn brown in color and match the existing copper roof. Due to the roof angle, the black rubber roof is only visible from a distance. You are able to start to see the edge of the steeple black roofing material from the back half of the parking lot.

During the copper roof tear off, several outer sections of the roof were found to be wet with rotting wood. Fortunately, the wood rot had not progressed to the point that required the replacement of the steeple roof planking boards. The wood rot was treated to kill the rot fungi and dried out. The affected roof sections were reinforced with an outer layer of plywood before the insulation and rubber roof was applied.

With the sanctuary roof buckets a thing of the past, we can look forward to a dry steeple roof and no leaks during the next rain storm.

Thank you to the GPUC congregation for your support of the steeple roof project.



Note: Venmo is a subsidiary of PayPal, and requires a credit card number for the transaction.




Breeze's checkout module gives you the options of donating using *Credit/Debit Cards or an ACH Payment directly from your bank account.*


