"rebaptizing" can be a powerful action, as pertains to the N-word, the American flag, the swastika, etc.

I've been livin' on the digital edge these past few years. I haven't backed up my hard drive since the pandemic began, which, as experience has taught me, is a disaster waiting to happen! So I've decided to get to that project over the holidays and while doing so, purge old files I no longer need. In doing so, I've discovered some pretty good sermons from the days when I used to write them out, word for word. I've also run across a sermon based on a few bullet points, which I did at GPUC not too long ago, and which I rather like. The remainder of this Meander is about one of the bullet points in that sermon.

You may even recall that sermon... in which I talked about our unconscious tendency to live in obeisance to the biographical narrative of our past. In simpler terms, "I've always been such and such a type of scoundrel, so I have to continue be the same such and such a type of scoundrel today as I've always been." Mind you, this is, I submit, our *unconscious* tendency and helps explain why personalities become so predictable over time – and why change is difficult.

I also suggested in that sermon (here's the bullet point) that at any time we can make a conscious choice not to be that same scoundrel we've always been. In other words, at any given point in time we can abandon our unconscious obeisance to the biographical narrative of our past and start writing our future biographical narrative based upon the different self we would like to become in the future. After all, while the pages of our past narrative are already writ, the future pages of our narrative remain blank - at present. Let us write away!

Methinks this is not a bad way to approach a new year. I will be considering it in earnest...
















Calling All GPUC Members!

Whether you are looking to pay toward your pledge, register for RE or just making a donation to the church, Breeze makes donating so easy that you can do it from the comfort of your couch.


Breeze's checkout module gives you the options of donating using *Credit/Debit Cards or an ACH Payment directly from your bank account.*

Now that we are having in-person services, we are resuming having flowers to add to the ambience of the Sanctuary on Sunday morning.


