

GPUC COVID GUIDELINES

Based on Wayne County community guidelines tracked on www.covid.cdc.gov

All members attending in person must have COVID vaccines up to date – virtual option also available. It is the expectation that all members and visitors would respectfully stay home or get tested if any question of active infection.

<u>Critical high spread</u> – board will determine if appropriate to be all virtual

<u>High spread</u> – N95 type mask highly recommend for in-person

<u>Medium spread</u> – Mask use recommended inperson --especially if you are at high risk for severe illness

Low spread – Mask use to your comfort level



Announcement Regarding Sunday Service Mask Policy

Dear Congregants,

It has been two years since the pandemic was declared, and our church began to worship on zoom and "mask up" to keep our beloved community safe. Throughout the pandemic, we have monitored the COVID case positivity rates closely to determine whether we could congregate safely, but have always asked you to wear a mask in the building.

We are excited to announce that we have lifted the mask requirement for Sunday services. With Wayne County's positivity rate dipping below 2%, we believe the time is right for this change. We will continue to monitor the Covid positivity rates and make science-based decisions if there are future surges. *It remains a requirement that all attendees are vaccinated and boosted for Covid.* We understand that some congregants will be more comfortable wearing masks when attending worship in person, and we will make N95 masks available for anyone that would like one. We will also continue to offer zoom services.

When visiting the church or meeting in smaller groups, we ask that congregants respect the wishes of others and continue to mask up if that is preferred by anyone in the group. All people entering the church are still expected to be fully vaccinated and boosted.

Worship services will continue to be provided online using Zoom.

It is recommended that you join early and use a laptop, desktop with a webcam or you may download the Zoom app on your tablet or smart phone via the App store. We also request when joining the online session limiting to one connection per household.

The Sunday worship service Zoom link will be sent by email on Friday afternoons, June 3, 10, 17 & 24.

This is what I imagined the black bear that walked through our front yard in Grayling last night was saying, as he glanced at me through the window of our cottage. It was a poignant reminder from a gentle friend. Black bears are seldom dangerous.

In truth, I have been struggling a great deal with all that we are facing these days: the mass shootings in Uvalde and Buffalo, exceeding one million deaths due to covid, the war in Ukraine, inflation near to running amok, political insanity (only a smidge too strong a word for our political dynamics these days), global warming, the list goes on... and on...

Last night's messenger recalibrated my system. He was a powerful reminder of many things

but mostly, that the world with which I have been greatly struggling lately is a world of our human creation. It is very far removed from the natural world that gives us birth and sustains us. Something is terribly awry.

But, since we created this problem set, we can fix it. I suggest we begin by asking ourselves, "How can we bring the world into greater harmony with life as it was meant to be, life in harmony, life that supports life, life that sees Life as the utmost value?" If such questions were the third rail of our political, social, and interpersonal discourse, what would our world be like then?

What say ye, Mr. Bear?






These discussions will be held virtually, led by members of the ARE Committee.




