Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church COVID Vaccination/Booster And Masking Policy

Throughout the pandemic, we have regularly updated our COVID policies to closely follow the Centers For Disease Control (CDC) recommendations on best practices to minimize COVID risk to our congregants.

The CDC has recently declared the COVID pandemic emergency stage to be over. The result for our church is that Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church will no longer require persons attending in-person services to be fully vaccinated and boosted. However, following CDC guidelines, **it is highly recommended** that all people who attend in-person services be fully vaccinated and boosted. Being fully vaccinated and boosted helps ensure the continued health and safety of our most precious resource, our people.

Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church continues to offer hybrid services (that is, in-person and on Zoom) each Sunday to ensure the most vulnerable among us can participate in services should they not feel comfortable attending in person. The church continues to make masks available for those who prefer to wear one during in-person services. **If members have even minor cold/flu/cough symptoms, we strongly encourage individuals to enjoy the service from home via Zoom.** 

Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church will continue to monitor CDC recommendations closely regarding COVID. Church COVID policy may change in the future as CDC guidelines evolve.

As our Religious Education year winds down, I want to express my deep appreciation for all the volunteers who made this year successful. #### SEVEN PRINCIPLE SUNDAE

COOKIE: A cookie at the bottom of the bowl represents the EARTH. Our 7th UU Principle reminds us to take care of the planet we call home. ICE CREAM: One or two scoops of ice cream represent LOVE. Love is the spirit of our church and is our 1st UU Principle to remind us to respond with love to everyone we meet, because each person is important.



**TOPPINGS:** Toppings like hot fudge, caramel or strawberries represent our 3rd UU Principle of learning, to be wise together. You chose your favorite to add and some even take a little of each because **WISDOM** can come from many places.

MIXED NUTS: Nuts represent our 4th UU Principle. We all are on a SEARCH for truth and meaning. You can search through these mixed nuts to find the ones you like to add to your life.WHIPPED CREAM: Adding whipped cream to your sundae represents the JUSTICE and EQUITY mentioned in our 2nd UU Principle. This makes life that much better.

**CHERRY:** A cherry on top represents **PEACE**. We work for a fair and peaceful world in our 6th UU Principle. World peace is the cherry on top of life we all must strive towards.

**SPRINKLES:** Adding a generous dash of red, white, and blue sprinkles. They represent **DEMOCRACY**, which is at the heart of our 5th Principle.




### Book Discussion Group News Tuesday, June 13, at 6 p.m.





Whether you are looking to pay toward your pledge, register for RE or just making a donation to the church, Breeze makes donating so easy that you can do it from the comfort of your couch.


Breeze's checkout module gives you the options of donating using *Credit/Debit Cards or an ACH Payment directly from your bank account.*
