


Book Discussion Group To Discuss "The Starless Sea"

The Board will be proposing an amendment to the church bylaws which will need to be voted on by the congregation. Therefore a **special meeting** will be held **after service on Sunday, April 18th**. There will be a brief special meeting held after church concerning an amendment to the Bylaws regarding Election and Terms. As you know the congregation approved a revision to the bylaws on May 19, 2019. At the suggestion of the Leadership Development Committee, the Board is recommending the following revision to Article VIII (F) and (H). The requested amendment is in bold, while the current provision is in normal text.

ARTICLE VIII - Elections and Terms

F. Chairs of Standing Committees shall serve two year terms, not to exceed three consecutive terms as Chair of the same committee, nor shall any of the above return to chair the same committee prior to a two year hiatus.

Chairs of Standing Committees shall serve one year terms, not to exceed two consecutive terms as Chair of the same committee, nor shall any of the above return to chair the same committee prior to a two year hiatus.

H. Members of the Leadership Development committee shall each serve a two year term, not to exceed three consecutive terms, nor shall any of the above return to serve on the Leadership Development committee prior to a two year hiatus.

As members of Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church, we are its stewards, and we are obliged to maintain the church and improve it for the next generation. This requires generosity—not just of time and assistance in supporting our many church programs, but also financial generosity, which flows from our gratitude for all that this church provides.

Of course, the COVID-19 pandemic has brought changes in the ways we now get together, whether it's Sunday Zoom services, or RE instruction, or drive-through events, from cookies to chili, or on-line book study groups. We are all working hard to keep our community alive and secure. Now, more than ever, perhaps, in these difficult days, it's a time to reflect on all the good things our church provides, and to be mindful of the debt of gratitude we owe to the dedicated staff on whom we all depend.

That leads us to the Canvass theme for this year: **Let's Get Through This Together!** And we *will*, get through this. But we need your help, especially now. As we are reminded frequently, by the good we do for each other, we are the church, and we are a church not defined by any one person, but by who we are, all of us together — a beloved community.

Your financial pledges of support for the next fiscal year will determine our ability to overcome the challenges that the pandemic has put in our path, and to keep our community strong. The church's total income this year is down 14%. But our expenses have declined by only 4%. This year's pledges totaled \$253,000, which provided only 67% of our \$335,500 budget. With the loss of the \$16,000 City of Grosse Pointe rental coming next year, increasing our pledge income becomes even more important than usual. Our goal is to increase total pledges 15%, to a total of \$314,500.

We understand that the pandemic has put special strains on some people's budgets, so that pledging becomes problematic. That is why we are asking those who are able, who may not have been so adversely affected by recent events, to consider increasing their pledges to get as close as possible to the average of \$2,740. Or consider an affordable percentage increase. At a minimum, we're asking everyone who is able to consider upping their pledges by 15%. If you break that down, month by month, or day by day, this is not a large dollar amount. We are depending on each other, now more than ever, to sustain our beloved community. Let's get through this together!





Canvass Committee Update: The 2020-2021 GPUC budget

On March 7th, the church will begin our annual financial pledge drive for the next fiscal year. **Due to pandemic related factors, our total income this year is down 14% from the prior year.** The graph below breaks down the sources of our income this fiscal year:



While our income has declined 14%, our costs have only declined by 4% because we continue to pay employee salaries and benefits and maintain our church building and grounds. Here's a graph showing where the money is being spent this year:




We can remedy the shortfall in income by asking members who have not been hurt by the pandemic to step up and increase their pledges. If members who *are* able are *willing* to meet this challenge, we can get through this dark period with minimal financial pain. We hope you will keep these facts in mind when making your pledge for next year.
