Note from the board regarding in-person services resuming

At its February meeting, the Board discussed the current status of Sunday services and the mask policy for entering the church building at other times. The Board recognizes that inperson services and other church activities are vitally important to the life of the church. At the same time, the Board has a duty to provide a safe environment for all church members, friends and visitors.

It was decided to **resume in-person Sunday services beginning February 27th**. Services will continue to be available via zoom and recorded for later viewing.

<u>The church will continue to require attendees at services be fully vaccinated and wear</u> <u>masks.</u> N95 masks are strongly encouraged and will be provided by the church for those who do not have one available. We will resume singing during services but <u>masks are to be worn</u> while singing.

For folks who have need to enter the church at times other than Sunday services, wearing masks will be encouraged (but not required for those who are fully vaccinated). However, in view of the different levels of risk assessment and tolerance among church members, friends, and visitors, the Board has adopted the following policy:

If any individual conducting business in the church building requests others in attendance to wear a mask, those others in the vicinity at that time will be expected to wear a mask or leave the building.

While the State of Michigan and Wayne County are still at "very high risk" level for COVID exposure, the numbers of daily cases and hospitalizations are decreasing rapidly and hospital census rates are also decreasing. It is in view of these facts that the Board took the action it did this week. As it has been doing since March 2020, the Board will continue to monitor the status of COVID rates in our community and modify church activities as warranted.

We remain hopeful that we can soon host even more in-person church activities as the weather warms.

Worship services will continue to be provided online using Zoom.

It is recommended that you join early and use a laptop, desktop with a webcam or you may download the Zoom app on your tablet or smart phone via the App store. We also request when joining the online session limiting to one connection per household.

The Sunday worship service Zoom link will be sent by email on Friday afternoons, March 4, 11, 18 & 25.

Start by noticing your own tendency. Do you lean toward despair or hope? Your answer to this question indicates where your attention falls.


The spiritual practice part of this is to place your attention where there is reason for hope. That placement of attention will define your reality. And who doesn't want a reality where we see reasons for hope?! As Dostoevsky said, "To live without hope is to cease to live."

We updated our mission and vision statement over the years. This is our present mission and vision statement.

Sunday, March 20 the students will learn about GPUC Founders Day.



Renga is a Japanese poetic form of "linked poetry" written by multiple collaborating poets. It is also a tool for socializing, as people sit together, writing individual two and three line verses. While each stanza should stand on its own, they should be linked by some common factor, such as shared images,

subject, words, seasons, etc. In the past, renga has also been used as a form of correspondence: one poet sends three lines to a friend, who responds with two lines, back and forth. The favorite length is a 36-line form called a *kasen*. However, renga can be hundreds of lines long.

Join us! Bring a friend, spouse, significant other, or acquaintance. We'll pair up, make a game of it and see how many interesting stanzas can be cobbled together from one session to another. Before you know it, <u>Spring</u> will be here!

This workshop will be held virtually and will be led by Bill Rehahn.




These discussions will be held virtually, led by members of the ARE Committee.


Spring Canvass Kickoff Party on Sunday, March 13th, right after the Sunday church service


Why Your Pledge of Financial Support Matters

Every spring we canvass our members and friends for a pledge of financial support for the upcoming fiscal year. Ours is a voluntary organization; consequently, your pledge of support is critical to the continuing viability of the church. We cannot plan a budget for the next fiscal year without knowing how much money our members are willing to pledge. Unlike some other church denominations, we do not receive any money from a national organization. One benefit of this is that Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church is governed by its members, not a church hierarchy. We should be proud that our locally run church mirrors our democratic values as Americans. But the price of that freedom is that the members must support the church. As you can see from the pie chart below, 74% of our income comes from members' support:



You can also see from the chart that 18% of our income comes from facility rental. The two largest rentals are the parking lot rental to Beaumont Grosse Pointe Hospital and the Wild Child Playschool. To increase our financial security, we need to decrease our reliance on facility rental income to support regular church operations, and instead devote rental income to maintenance and improvements. If we ever expect to grow our church, we'll need extra money to fund improvements to our physical plant. For example, wouldn't it be nice to expand the church lobby, so we can have a larger, more comfortable coffee hour after church services?

Despite the pandemic, which limited in person services, our fixed operating costs declined very, very little. As you can see from the following pie chart, most of our expenditures are for staff salaries, which continue regardless of whether we are meeting in person or via Zoom.



The GPUC Operatiing Budget is \$335,600

Personnel expenses total 68% of our operating budget. Although Building and Grounds totaled only 5% of the budget last year, several years ago we borrowed \$93,000 for an urgent roof repair. A balloon payment of the \$30,000 balance will become due in the next fiscal year. Wouldn't it be nice to be able to pay off that remaining debt, instead of refinancing the loan?

Rev. Alex gave a sermon in December, talking about our church as an "oasis", a sacred place where we find sustenance and renewal. It's a place for our never-ending spiritual and personal growth. It's a place where we bring our children to acquire good values to take into adulthood. It's a place where friendships and acquaintances delight us and enrich our lives. It's a place where we grieve and memorialize the people we have lost. This "oasis" didn't just magically appear. It is a gift from previous members, that most of us don't even know, who spent their resources to build and to maintain something wonderful that we enjoy today.

This year's Canvass theme is "Pay It Forward", recognizing the profound gratitude we have for this beloved community and calling members to make a generous pledge to support it. Pay it forward. Pay our share forward so that our church will continue to be the oasis that sustains and renews us all. Thank you.

The newest committee at the GPUUC falls within the overall intentions of the Social Justice Committee, and this is the Earth Justice Sub-Committee. Teresa Ramsey and Samuel Pruitt are getting this started now and invite anyone in our congregation to consider joining us on this committee.

We now have a page on the GPUUC.org website under "What We Do." The focus this committee wants to take is to educate about what is going on locally and globally, and what each of us can do as individuals, families, citizens that is practical and effective in making a difference.

One of the immediate requests we want to make in case you don't read any further, is to ask anyone that eats vegan, enjoys and has access to vegan recipes, to submit as many recipes as you want to by March 15, 2022 to teresa.ramsey510@gmail.com. Please include your name, the source of the recipe (especially if its an original), a photo of the prepared food, and contact information in case I cannot understand some directions.

Looking ahead, here are some basic goals:

- 1. "End of your fork" initiative: bringing awareness about the impact of simply eating lighter on the food chain-a plant based diet. The Youth at GPUUC are practicing a 'Meatless Monday" and their Buddha Bowl experiences look delicious! We want to put together a delicious tried and true recipe book for our congregation and have it posted on our webpage for everyone to print out.
- 2. "Single Use Plastics Must Go" initiative: the use of grocery bags that are thin plastic and wind up being tossed in the trash, plastic wrap, zip lock bags, etc. have enormous implications to marine life, to the piling up of trash in rivers, lakes, the oceans, and break down in to microscopic pieces that wind up in the gut of marine life-and cause illness and death. Also, the people that live by the petrochemical plants that produce that plastic are ill, and struggling. We will be going into this more as the weeks unfold.
- 3. **Climate Reality:** this is a big one. Maybe the biggest threat to everything we may do to aim and work towards living fulfilling lives and preparing for fulfilling lives for future generations. Samuel Pruitt is especially prepared to educate and guide us to steps to help bring balance and restoration. Samuel will be giving a presentation in late April about Climate Reality. Samuel will talk about the science of the climate crisis, and show the impacts and talk about the solutions in the slide show presentation. He will use slides put together by the Former Vice President Mr. Al Gore and the Climate Reality Project. Samuel was trained virtually by the Climate Reality Project and Mr. Al Gore.
- 4. Locally, we want to learn about what is going on with Lake St. Clair, and the Great Lakes Water Authority issues. Much more about this later.


Giving Made Easy Thanks to Breeze!


