We updated our mission and vision statement over the years. This is our present mission and vision statement.

Please come to the luncheon and parents sign up with Google that has been sent out through our main office.




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Book Discussion Group News Tuesday, March 21, at 6 pm

Note: Venmo is a subsidiary of PayPal, and requires a credit card number for the transaction.



On January 22nd, Rev. Riegel gave a sermon entitled, "A Link in the Chain". He talked about the history of Unitarianism, going back to the rejection of the orthodox religious beliefs of the early 19th century and the birth of the Unitarian movement. He talked about how each of us and our congregation are links in the chain of liberal religion. Our beautiful church home stands as a beacon of liberal religion, a refuge for people who have faced oppression or alienation, who seek a religious home for themselves and their families. He reminded us that many of us have found this community as a place where our children learn the important principles of unconditional love and radical inclusivity.

Liberal religion is struggling right now in our country, and we represent the thin veil between our beliefs and elements of our culture that threaten the ideas we hold so dear. He reminded us that this church is a great gift to us, and as members of this church, we have the responsibility to support our church, as generously as we are able. This year, that responsibility carries a much larger price tag.

The Canvass Committee is asking for your help in Fixing the Hole- not just the roof, where the rain got in, but the large hole in the budget caused by the end of the parking lot rental by Beaumont Hospital Grosse Pointe. For decades, we enjoyed a substantial yearly income from the rental of the parking lot, plus the savings because the hospital paid for snow removal in the winter. Recently the hospital did not renew its contract with us, creating a \$47,000 hole in the budget. We also had to take out a \$100,000 loan to fix the leaks in the sanctuary roof which, consolidated with the prior \$60,000 roof leak loan, has resulted in annual payments totaling \$23,000/year. As a result, we must increase pledge income from \$250,000 to \$300,000 for the next fiscal year. This means we must increase pledges by an average of 20%. We know that some of our members do not have the resources to increase their pledge by 20%, which means that the rest of us should consider an even bigger increase in our pledge for next year. It is time for everyone who can, step up and meet this challenge.

If we don't, we become the weak link in the chain, and we will be forced to make some very unpleasant cuts in our budget. If we are to fulfill the mission of this church, now and for the future, it is critical that we meet this challenge.


Breeze's checkout module gives you the options of donating using *Credit/Debit Cards or an ACH Payment directly from your bank account.*

How to Spot Phishing in Emails

Buy now. Pay over time.

Simply select PayPal Credit at checkout and enjoy No Interest if paid in full in 6 months. Subject to credit approval. See terms. US customers only.

Seller note to customer

Your purchase was accepeted and payment was processed. There is evidence that an unauthorized party accessed your PayPal account. Your account has been charged \$436.00 for the e-wallet credit purchase. This transaction will be reflected in the automatically debited amount on your activity after 24 hours. If you feel that you did not conduct this transaction correctly, please contact us immediately at 1-888-312-4828 or reach us for assistance. Our business hours are from 6:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. Pacific Time. Scammers use automated systems to make transactions. Only contact PayPal through the Contact details given above to contact Customer Service.

Take a look at the image above. At first glance, it may seem like a legitimate invoice is being sent from PayPal but unfortunately this is a scam. Recently, one of our very own members here at GPUC, fell victim to this very email scam.

To help our members and friends avoid these scams in the future, here are some tips:

Tip #1: Always Check not only the "Sender" Email Address but also the "Reply To" email. Sometimes the sender email address will look legitimate such as the example below but if you look closely at the Reply To Address, it is completely different.

Tip #2: (For Paypal Scams) Paypal does not send out invoices. Paypal is a safe financial processor for various Merchants around the world and invoices will usually be sent directly from the Merchants with your consent. You would find these invoices when logging in to your paypal account. If you do not have a paypal account, they offer a guest check out option but again, they do not send emails, Merchant accounts do.

Tip #3: If there is a phone number listed on the invoices and you happen to call, do not give them any personal information or fill out any forms they pressure you to fill out. If you do not have any memory of making a purchase or submitting to make a purchase with a Merchant, this is more than likely a scam.


Tip #4:


If they ask you to go to a CVS to purchase gift cards or Western Union and ask you to stay on the phone with them while you do these things, it is a scam. Do not get in your car and stay on

the phone with these people.

Tip #5: Some of the emails will come masked with a name you may be familiar with such as family, friends, work colleagues, etc. Again, refer to tip #1 and check the sender/reply to information. If you know the name of the person is real and you have additional contact information for this person, contact that individual via phone call immediately to confirm that the email you received was from them and if it is not that person, it is definitely a scam.


Tip #6: When You do receive these types of emails, you should "Report as Phishing" to your email provider. (See images below)



National Slam the Scam Day March 9, 2023



On National Slam the Scam Day and throughout the year, we give you the tools to recognize Social Security-related scams and stop scammers from stealing your money and personal information. Share scam information with your loved ones. Slam the Scam!

Recognize the four basic signs of a scam:

- Scammers **pretend** to be from a familiar organization or agency, like the Social Security Administration. They may email attachments with official-looking logos, seals, signatures, or pictures of employee credentials.
- Scammers mention a problem or a prize. They may say your Social Security number was involved in a crime or ask for personal information to process a benefit increase.
- 3. Scammers **pressure** you to act immediately. They may threaten you with arrest or legal action.
- 4. Scammers tell you to **pay** using a gift card, prepaid debit card, cryptocurrency, wire or money transfer, or by mailing cash. They may also tell you to transfer your money to a "safe" account.

Ignore scammers and report criminal behavior. Report Social Security-related scams to the SSA Office of the Inspector General (OIG).
