We also request when joining the online session limiting to one connection per household. The Sunday worship service Zoom link will be sent by email on Friday afternoons, October 2, 9, 16, 23 & 30.

UNFAMILIAR WITH ZOOM? - DO THIS IN ADVANCE OF SUNDAY

- If you are unfamiliar with Zoom, become acquainted with the technology it is easy to use but going through these steps in advance will ensure you are ready.
- Click on the Zoom link that will be emailed on the Friday prior to the Sunday service at least 15 minutes before you plan to use it the first time. This will prompt an app to download onto your device. You may use a laptop, tablet, desktop or smartphone.
- You will then be asked whether you wish to join the "meeting" with your device audio and device camera.
 - If you do not want others to see what you are wearing at that moment, you can join without activating your camera.
 - Throughout the service, all participants besides the worship leaders will be muted to prevent background noises (barking dogs, ringing phones, etc.) from being included in the worship service.

Sermon: "Galileo's Telescope"

In 1610, Galileo announced that he had discovered mountains on the moon, that Jupiter itself possessed moons, and that the sun was the center of the universe. Such claims were considered scientific anathema because fellow astronomers of the day were convinced that Aristotle's cosmological scheme was correct (the earth was the center of the universe and all heavenly bodies were perfect spheroids). Hence, Galileo's fellow astronomers refused to look through Galileo's telescope. This historical legend stands as a metaphor for the refusal to admit disconfirming evidence in defense of one's own bias. Dr. Riegel will discuss "Galileo's telescope" relative to Unitarian Universalism's principle: "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning."

October 2020


Gloucester was referencing his brother's rise to the throne, King Edward IV of England. That was an entirely different (theatrical) context than the context in which we currently find ourselves. Nevertheless, the words seem entirely apropos. The longer this pandemic wears on, the more frequently I encounter discontent. A sort of Covid numbness has set in; a psychological winter of our discontent.

One of my favorite movies is "My Life As a Dog." It is a Swedish film about a young boy (Ingemar) whose father was lost in the Second World War, whose mother becomes terminally ill, and so gets shipped off from relative to care for him. Ingemar suffers his own discontent, as one might imagine a child in such circumstances would. To console himself, Ingemar ponders how lucky he is at least not to have been Laika.

Laika was a stray mongrel from the streets of Moscow, whom the Russians sent to space in Sputnik II. That was in 1957, before anyone had figured out how safely to return a space vehicle to earth. So, she met her demise alone, in the loneliness of space... There are almost always those who have it worse than we do... Ingemar found his comfort in that fact.

As I think about the situation we face today, my mind often wanders back to the rural villages of India. Those villagers, too, now face this global pandemic. But even before the pandemic came upon us, they were facing trials and tribulations unbeknownst to us in the Western world. I recall the young untouchable girl who lived by the highway and beat rats out of the fields with a stick for her evening meal [pictured right]. I recall the leper that sat outside the city Museum begging for rupees every day [pictured right]. And, I recall the elderly woman living penniless on a couple of bowls of rice a day, her family having abandoned her due to their own poverty [pictured below]. I adored this woman and visited her on every pilgrimage I took. On my







Yes, we face a winter of our discontent but we remain blessed. At least we are not Laika... So, don't forget, every day, to count your blessings!

And, don't forget that also inside you resides an inexorable sun. Keep yours eyes fixed on that.




Book Discussion with Dr. Riegel

Last Sunday, 9/27, Dr. Riegel delivered a sermon in which he emphasized the need to question the dominant historical narrative of the United States, esp. important for white allies of racial justice work! We cannot guarantee that you will receive the Zoom invite if you register after that time.


GPUC Book Discussion Group


