
We've recently discovered that there is a phishing scheme being conducted on our GPUC main website.

GPUC COVID GUIDELINES

Based on Wayne County community guidelines tracked on www.covid.cdc.gov

All members attending in person must have COVID vaccines up to date – virtual option also available. It is the expectation that all members and visitors would respectfully stay home or get tested if any question of active infection.

<u>Critical high spread</u> – board will determine if appropriate to be all virtual

<u>High spread</u> – N95 type mask highly recommend for in-person

<u>Medium spread</u> – Mask use recommended inperson --especially if you are at high risk for severe illness

Low spread – Mask use to your comfort level



Church COVID Vaccination/Booster and Masking Policies:

Throughout the pandemic, we have regularly updated our policies and monitored the latest guidance from the CDC. At our most recent Board meeting, we agreed to continue the requirement of updated vaccination status per CDC guidelines (which now include the new bivalent booster) for all individuals who join our Sunday Services in the church and for the GPUC staff. Recognizing the limited availability of the new bivalent booster, we are asking staff to be vaccinated by October 15th, and would ask that congregants update their boosters within the next 60 days. We will have a vaccine clinic at the church on October 2nd, and the new bivalent booster will be available.

Vaccine clinic at the church on October 2nd

GPUC offers hybrid services (in-person and on zoom) each Sunday to ensure the most vulnerable among us can participate if they are not comfortable joining in person. We make N95 masks available at the church. We encourage attendees of in-person Sunday Services to mask and also to respect the wishes of at-risk congregants if they prefer masking in small group meetings. We strongly encourage individuals to mask if they have even minor Cold/flu/allergy symptoms.

Worship services will continue to be provided online using Zoom.

It is recommended that you join early and use a laptop, desktop with a webcam or you may download the Zoom app on your tablet or smart phone via the App store. We also request when joining the online session limiting to one connection per household.

The Sunday worship service Zoom link will be sent by email on Friday afternoons, October 7, 14, 21 & 28.

UNFAMILIAR WITH ZOOM? - DO THIS IN ADVANCE OF SUNDAY

- Sign onto zoom meeting link 15 minutes prior to service.
- Bring a chalice or a small candle so you can light the chalice when we do.
- Have the order of service handy either electronically or in printed form, so you can follow along with the service.
- Have your preferred refreshments and hot beverages ready to enjoy during the service.
- Enjoy the service and provide email feedback to us on how this option is working for you.

Our GPUC youth are our blessing! Our youth are going to Boston in June 2023. The fundraising has begun, and you will be seeing posters, news articles, bake sales, things to purchase, Buddha bowl dinner, spaghetti dinner event and more. The youth of Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church are planning their trip to Boston to learn more about our faith and the cradle of our early heritage as a nation. Any student in 6th grade through 12th grade is eligible to join the trip. They must be registered in the Religious Education Program.

Why do we plan a Boston trip? A trip to Boston can help to make our liberal heritage a real part of the lives for our youth and parents. A youth group trip to Boston can be fun, help build community, and be a great learning experience for all involved. They will visit the downtown Unitarian Universalist churches where important historical events occurred, see the public statues of our heroes, the graves of our forebears, and visit the UUA and the staff. 

GPUC Steeple Roof Renovation

Starting October 3rd, the Lutz Roofing company will be repairing the flat sections of the steeple roof. The work will take approximately 10 days (**Oct. 3rd to Oct. 12th**). Lutz will be using ladders and a lift to access the roof on the south side of the sanctuary roof near the chimney. Lutz will try to minimize the disturbance around the sanctuary by storing material on the roof. Lutz will utilize several parking spots in our lot to store material during construction.

The work may be noisy at times. Anyone with planned activities for the garden, patio area or sanctuary should be aware of the possible construction noise and disturbance. Outside of the construction noise, Lutz will plan their work such that the garden and patio can still be used during construction.

I am looking forward to a leak free sanctuary! If you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to contact me. I plan to be on site at the church most days during the roof repair.






Book Discussion Group News Tuesday, October 18th, at 6 pm

Whether you are looking to pay toward your pledge, register for RE or just making a donation to the church, Breeze makes donating so easy that you can do it from the comfort of your couch.


Breeze's checkout module gives you the options of donating using *Credit/Debit Cards or an ACH Payment directly from your bank account.*
