

GPUC COVID GUIDELINES

Based on Wayne County community guidelines tracked on www.covid.cdc.gov

All members attending in person must have COVID vaccines up to date – virtual option also available. It is the expectation that all members and visitors would respectfully stay home or get tested if any question of active infection.

<u>Critical high spread</u> – board will determine if appropriate to be all virtual

<u>High spread</u> – N95 type mask highly recommend for in-person

<u>Medium spread</u> – Mask use recommended inperson --especially if you are at high risk for severe illness

Low spread - Mask use to your comfort level



Church COVID vaccination/booster and masking policies

It has been two years since the pandemic was declared, and our church began to worship on Zoom and to "mask up" to keep our beloved community safe. Throughout the pandemic, we have continuously updated our policies and will monitor the latest guidance from the CDC on the bivalent booster that will soon be available. Currently, we require vaccinations including boosters for all individuals who join our Sunday Services in the church and for the GPUC staff. We offer hybrid services (in-person and on Zoom) each Sunday to ensure the most vulnerable among us can participate if they are not comfortable joining in person. We make N95 masks available at the church. Each Friday we send out an email blast that identifies the current CDC masking guidelines for each community based on the local COVID positivity rates. Thank you for your continued attention to this matter and your respect for the wishes of at-risk congregants if they prefer masking.



Welcome to the 2022-23 Religious Education Program! This church school year we are back in person! We are creating new ways to learn and be together. We will be holding classes in person, outside, and we will go on field trips. We have a resilience we did not know we had. We are UU's and we can do this. 


Giving Made Easy Thanks to Breeze!


